We were thrilled to find out that we were so familiar with so many of the songs written by these experts. There were over 900 songs and about 45 musicals written. Some of the most popular musicals were "Oklahoma," "Carousel," "Sound of Music," "The King and I," and "South Pacific."

Reno had his repertoire on single sheets so he could give us a taste of many of these tunes. Bob just looked over and was able to add accompaniment. Accordion and bass sure go well together. As always, Reno gives us info along with entertaining us. Ex. "Do, Re, Mi" is based on the circle of 5ths.

We heard some of the lyrics written by Hammerstein. He had quite an imagination. Ex. "Surry with the Fringe on the Top." Listen carefully next

time to the lyrics.

Reno and Bob have no problem switching from one style of music to another. Ex. Love ballad to jazz. "My Favorite Things" was jazz.

Here are just some of the songs we enjoyed "Where or When," "My Funny Valentine," "Have You Seen Miss Jones," "Blue Room," which was written for Benny Goodman, "Dancing on the Ceiling," "This Can't Be Love," "Falling in Love With Love," "I Could Write a Book," "Bewitched", "Lady is a Tramp," which was written for Frank Sinatra, "Might As Well Be Spring," and "My Romance." a beautiful song written for Jimmy Durante.

We also learned about musicals where voices were dubbed in as the actress could not sing. Ask Reno?

It was truly a fine performance and very educational. I was so pleased to have a front row seat as I could see how Bob could sustain a note by drawing it down the string. It is easier on an accordion to extend the bellows or on the piano to press the sustain petal. Great job you two!!! Marcia Coullahan
