This father and son duo from Stockton, in the heart of the Central Valley of California, has been playing together for over 30 years.

Steve Trucco began taking lessons in 1949 at the age of 10. Steve began his professional career 69 years ago with a small four-piece group in the Stockton area. Today, Steve, 80 years young and happily married to Judy Burke-Trucco, still loves to play music and is available for weddings, parties or wherever they will let him play.

Steve's son Michael began his professional career in his father's group playing at weddings and dances throughout the valley. After college he returned to Stockton and continued the family tradition. Michael now 43, balances his time between his father's band and playing keyboard for the Long Time band. This group pays tribute to the legendary rock band Boston.

Mike is the proud father of two beautiful girls, Chloe and Eva and is devoted to his fiancee Lisa Mills.

In October of 2016 Steve had the honor of playing the old Northern Italian Style music in Tre Fontane, Italy. Together, Steve and Michael play mostly Italian waltzes and polkas, mixing in a few standards from the 40's and 50's, where Michael handles the vocals. They have played at the Las Vegas International Accordion Convention, and the Italian Festival at the El Dorado in Reno. Their many other appearances include Cotati, the Lodi Grape Festival, several northern California accordion clubs, the Valtarese Foundation Scholarship Dinner in New York, and the Victory Park Concert Series every year since its inception.

Their unique style of playing duets has been honed to almost an art form. Even though they are two separate accordionists, when they play together, they seem to meld into a single accordionist. Maybe being father and son has something to do with that.


We look forward to seeing you all for our August concert, featuring **Steve and Mike Trucco**, among our most favorite performers! See you then!



Our headliner, Gordon Kohl is truly an accomplished musician. Gordon has played for over 45 years. He has an interest and demonstrated that he can play all types of music. He was exposed to ethnic varieties at an early age, and regional music around the U.S. Gordon has a band and is very busy playing gigs that often last up to five hours. He said it was truly a pleasure to see professional ballroom dancers dance to his music.

Gordon played a Concerto digital accordion. This is his instrument of choice, although he is equally proficient with acoustic accordions. Continued on page 5

In his view, the next generation of players seem to be more interested in the greatly increased versatility of the electronic instrument. Gordon certainly demonstrated that by changing "voice" within a melody from an accordion to a xylophone, to a guitar, to a piano... There were none of the distracting pauses that sometimes occur when a player searches around for the right button to make changes.

He began with *The Tango Waltz* which is written in three quarter time, but is a tango. He played musettes, polkas, waltzes, and songs we all know and love, examples being *Granada*, *Under Paris Skies*, *La Vie en Rose*, *Somewhere My Love* and *Margaritaville*. At one point in his performance Gordon switched to country western tunes which pleased our cowboys. Gordon played many songs with familiar words, *I Can't Stop Loving You*, *Can I Have This Dance*, and *Help Me Make it Through The Night*.

Gordon's main interest is teaching. He has his own music school. Here is a Gordon tip!!! Some songs should be played "simple". Single notes can say it all, just think of "Taps."

He gave us a schedule for memorizing:

KNOW AND PRACTICE YOUR SCALES REGULARLY!


Visualize.

Think, Get your timing, What patterns do you see? Broken scales, triplets, etc. Work out fingering.

Listen to what you are playing. [Ed note: You can also use video on your phone's camera. It captures sound. Play the video back to hear yourself. Forget the image. Don't get depressed!] Review.

Memorize small parts at a time.

Gordon finished his program with a fabulous medley of patriotic songs. He commented that throughout his career he played frequently for military personnel.

Driving directions to Christ Episcopal Church, 1040 Border Road, Los Altos, CA 94024

From Hwy 280, San Jose area: North on Hwy 280, exit at El Monte Road, East (toward the Bay, away from the hills) at the 3rd signal, turn right on University Ave, (if you get to the Foothill Expressway, you have gone one block too far) approx. ¹/₄ mile to end of University, turn right, go about 100 feet, turn left on Border Road. In one block you will see the Christ Episcopal Church sign, turn right into the driveway and go to the top of the hill for parking.

From Hwy 280, San Mateo and other northern locations, take 280 south to El Monte Road and go east away from the hills and toward the bay. At the 3rd signal, turn right on University Ave, drive approx.. ¹/₄ mile to end, turn right, go 100 feet, turn left onto Border Road. In one block, you will see the Christ Episcopal Church sign, turn right into the driveway and to top of hill for parking.
