

March 6, 2022, Zoom Meeting with Mike Zampiceni

Mike Zampiceni is known to most of us as a well-known accordionist, keyboardist, vocalist, and teacher. From day one there was an accordion within reach at the Zampiceni household and a professional accordionist, his father, to assist. Throughout his career Mike, unlike so many of us, never put the accordion in the closet. His diligence paid off.

We were treated to a broad and diverse repertoire. Mike is at home playing classical as he is playing Latin, traditional, or jazz. We enjoyed his rendition of "Fascinating Rhythm," and "I've Got Rhythm," by George Gershwin 1924 & 1930, "Polka Dots and Moonbeams," by Jimmy Van Heusen 1940, and "Masquerade," by Leon Russell. In light of current events, Mike played a couple of Ukrainian dance pieces. He also played "Willow Weep for Me," by Ann Ronell in 1932. Mike commented on how few women composers there have been through the years. She also wrote a tune that we can all sing at least a part of "Who's Afraid of the Big Bad Wolf," and remember the story of "The Three Little Pigs."

Mike also played and sang "Sing," written by Joe Raposo in 1971. This song was written for "Sesame Street," and often performed by The Carpenters. Mike played "They Can't Take That Away from Me," commented, tongue and cheek on the coming up date, April 15th.

At the end of the performance Mike was able to play all requests and in any key. Examples "Embraceable You," "Besame Mucho," "All the Things You Are," "Danny Boy," "Misty," "Dream," and two fast tunes, "Ferry Boat Song," and "Wearing of the Green."



Don Savant Reno Di Bono

It Was an exciting day on Sunday, April 3, as we celebrated our first in-person meeting in two years. Twenty attendees, all dutifully wearing masks, were present at 1:30 when the jam session started. Half the attendees were making the music, and the other half were a more appreciative audience than we deserved, many of us being quite rusty after the two-year hiatus. It was fun to play and hear live, in-person accordion music. Many thanks to Bob Stanfield for providing the music books and leading us in this session.

Bill Tapogna then stepped in to coordinate the open session and introduce the players. The first was Tseli Wu, who did a lovely rendition of two different waltzes on her new woodtone accordion. She told us that she bought it online, without even seeing it, and is very happy with it. Next, we enjoyed several songs played by Sonja Krave on her small Roland. She first demonstrated how a tune sounded with the digital accompaniment, and then with the drumbeats that the instrument can provide. Don Savant followed with "Wonderful World," to emphasize the hopeful outlook we all have now. Later, Don played another hopeful song, "People," made famous by Barbra Streisand. Reno Di Bono entertained us with three tunes, including a very peppy number called "Comedian's Gallop."

Bill then led us in an emotional moment of silence, to honor five members of the club who we have lost during the past two years: Norma Parsons, MaryBarbara Zorio, Don Pandori, William de Michaelis, and Frances Lam. Bill went on to thank a number of members who have helped the club keep going. These included Colette Ogata (President), Pam Kawashima (coordinating performers & recording meetings,) Rosemary (Finance,) and Bernie Coullahan (who has been dealing with official paperwork and who obtained the insurance we need to use the church facility.) After the break, the raffle of eleven items was spirited and lively.

Following the raffle, the twenty in-person attendees were joined by at least a dozen on Zoom as Bill introduced our featured artists, Bob Stanfield and Bill Likens.

Bob began playing the accordion when in the 7th grade, taking lessons from the Leo Reis Accordion Studios in Southern California. He played his accordion for a couple of years, then put it aside for high school sports, college and two careers. When he retired in 1995 and found that he could still play his accordion, he began to challenge himself with more advanced music. He joined the Silicon Valley Accordion Society in 2004 and served as treasurer for 15 years. He formed the Sunday Seven Band in 2008 with players from SVAS, which plays for several retirement homes, also at First Fridays in Los Altos, and plays once a year at the San Jose Giants Games for their Italian Night. The Sunday Seven band plays a variety of music including polkas, waltzes, sing-alongs, and oldies, plus German, Italian and Irish music. Bob also plays in a group called the "Leikaring & Spelemannslag," with Bill Likens and other musicians, an ensemble that plays for a Norwegian folk dance group in Mountain View.

A long-time accordion player, Bill plays traditional European music from Scandinavia, Germany, Ireland, and the Balkans. Bill was born in Bavaria and grew up as an American living in Germany, Austria, and various locations in the United States. He has made many trips to Norway and Germany to collect music. He is a member of the German Oktoberfest band Alpine Sound and was for many years the music director for the Nordahl Grieg Leikaring & Spelemannslag, a local Norwegian American folk dance and music group. Bill also often plays at local Irish music sessions and is leader of the local Musikantenstammtisch, a monthly German music jam session.

Bob and Bill played 21 numbers during their ambitious and entertaining program, introducing each number with informative commentary. Many of the numbers were folk dances from Norway, with a few Irish, Swedish, and American numbers included as well. They played mostly duets, though they included some solos as well. Though most of the delightful numbers were new to me, there were a few familiar tunes included. One that Bob did as a solo was "I Believe," which was composed during the Korean War, and which became quite famous in the United States. Bill's solo was a Macedonian song, which had unique tonality and interesting rhythms. It was easy to imagine people doing a complicated dance to this music. Another solo by Bob was "City of New Orleans," which was composed by Steve Goodman during a ride on a train by that name and recorded by both Arlo Guthrie and Willie Nelson.


Some of the descriptions I wrote down during Bob and Bill's performance pretty much sum up our experience of listening to this fun parade of songs: melody and harmony switching back and forth, slow tempo polka, carousel waltz, delightful, robust tune, intricate harmony, emphatic, stomping, melodic, image of line dancing, fast fingering, loud and emphatic at the end, rollicking, points of emphasis suggest dramatic dance steps, fast tempo polka, lively, pleasing, nice melody, toe tapper. Several of the tunes made me want to get up and dance myself.

The meeting concluded just before 4:30 and those of us who were there in person are certainly looking forward to future in-person meetings. What a lovely way to spend a Sunday afternoon!
