SVAS Next Meeting: Sunday April 2nd
At Christ Episcopal Church in Palo Alto
Featuring Norwegian Folk Music and Dance Group



This group of dancers is officially known as Nordahl Grieg Leikarring og Spelemannslag. This entertaining group of dancers is a non-profit social and performing group that meets for practice weekly at the Unitarian Universlist Church in Palo Alto on Wednesday Evenings, focusing on traditional Norwegian dances and dances from other Scandinavian countries. Led by Meg Laycock and Tom Sears, they welcome visitors to any of their weekly classes. For their performances, the dancers wear traditional Norwegian dress. The group takes their name from the Sons of Norway Nordahl Grieg Lodge, where they originally formed.

Nordahl Grieg was a Norwegian journalist, novelist, and popular poet who flew with RAAF during WWII as an observer and correspondent; his plane was shot down and he was killed along with the aircraft crew in 1943. Though the name is a bit unusual for everyday folk, definitions of the words are helpful: A Leikarring is a Norwegian folk dance group and a Spelemannslag is a group of folk musicians (ensemble). You won't want to miss their colorful dance and music presentations.

The meeting on March 5 was notable for the fine performances that demonstrated a variety of genres and styles.



Our first performer was Bill Likens, who played Irish tunes. Some were polkas, some were reels, and one song was a ballad that included Bill singing along. He fielded questions about his Fismen accordion, which was a 72-bass instrument with a few of the bass notes sounding in a lower octave than normal. He has a wireless microphone installed inside the bellows, but didn't use that for this performance. I asked him about the California flag sticker that was on his instrument, and he said it was a mark of pride when he plays his accordion while visiting family in Austria.



Our second performer, Tseli Wu, caused several who were in attendance to say: "Why do we need featured guest performers when we have members who can play like that?" Tseli performed three numbers, including two waltzes and a very challenging piece called "Czardas." This last number had some very dramatic sections, some light and tender interludes, and a lively and dramatic ending. All these numbers were played from memory and were very impressive



Don Savant was our third performer, and he entertained us with familiar songs that are so wonderful to hear again. These included "What the World Needs Now," "I Left My Heart in San Francisco," "These Foolish Things," "Dream a Little Dream of Me," and "The Echo, My Shadow, and Me" which was made famous by a group called the "Ink Spots" in 1939. It is always a pleasure when Don plays for us and brings us these memories.



Reno DiBono was next with his music lesson for us. He started by playing the "William Tell Overture" and "If I Were a Rich Man" (from Fiddler on the Roof). He accompanied the latter song with a little singing as well. Then he explained about vamps. According to Wikipedia, a vamp is a repeating musical figure or accompaniment. Reno demonstrated two well-known vamps, one from "Chorus Line" and the other from "New York, New York." We all recognized those immediately. He then went on to demonstrate the idea of stacking chords and played some examples. Adding the 4th of the scale below the minor chorus adds tension and gets the audience to listen more intently before the chord resolves. Thanks for expanding our knowledge, Reno.

Our featured entertainment this month was a performance by the Happy Days Band, performing without Bill Tapogna and his wife Gloria, who are dealing with health issues. Members of the band include three accordionists (Tseli Wu, Marcia Coullahan and Colette Ogata) and a violinist (Sharon Teeter). They made a nice picture in their coordinated outfits with green Irish hats.



They played an entire program of Irish songs, eleven in all. Marcia said a few words to introduce each song, and then Tseli played the lead-in measures to get everyone started. Most of the songs were familiar to us and helped into the spirit for Saint Patrick's Day, coming up on March 17. Their song list included "My Wild Irish Rose," "When Irish Eyes are Smiling," "When you and I Were Young, Maggie." "Luck of the Irish Medley." "Harrigan," "Cockles and Mussels," "Peggy O'Neil," "I'm Looking over a Four Leaf Clover," "Macnamara's Band," "Sweet Rosie O'Grady," and "The Band Played On." I imagine that this group had a good time practicing together for this performance, which was very enjoyable indeed.
